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THPRD VOLUNTEERS SUPPORT SHORT-TERM NATURE PROJECTS IN RECORD NUMBERS

Following a global trend, the Tualatin Hills Park & Recreation District's Natural Resources Department is offering more one-time, short-term volunteer opportunities.

And the strategy is working well, with volunteer counts significantly higher than year-earlier figures.

According to Bruce Barbarasch, THPRD superintendent of Natural Resources, the number of NR volunteers doing short-term projects during the 2015-16 fiscal year soared 73% over the 2014-15 number, to nearly 3,000. That followed a 23% increase in the previous fiscal year.

(Those numbers are for short-term volunteers only. THPRD also has hundreds of volunteers who participate in longer-term projects each year.)

"Our short-term volunteer contributions have hit a record high," Barbarasch said. "We're finding people are more likely to donate their time if they can do one-time projects of 2-3 hours rather than making a longer-term commitment."

In conjunction with the trend, NR has also streamlined its paperwork to make signing up for projects as easy as possible.

Other outreach efforts Natural Resources has initiated in recent years:

- Expanded its service learning program to include Ridgewood Elementary School and Five Oaks Middle School. Natural Resources also works with the Beaverton School District's Health & Science School and is partnering with Dig In, a local nonprofit organization, to assist middle school students at Rachel Carson School of Environmental Science.
- Became more strategic on where to schedule daylong volunteer opportunities, usually with dedicated community partners who help the district advocate and recruit for volunteers.
- Added part-time staff members to assist with project management and volunteer program support, freeing up Melissa Marcum, the coordinator, to focus on higher priorities, including greater responsiveness to the public.
